The title of this article, [constantly connected – the effects of smart-devices on mental health](#), aptly describes how technology allows us around the clock access, to browse the internet, game, email, use social media or make a call, from the one device. For many of us it is an integral part of our lives.

Over-use can negatively impact on our wellbeing, surprising not due to the amount of time we spend, but more so due to the nature of the relationship or involvement we may have with the device. Involvement in this case, describes the extent to which people are aware of where their phone is at all times, use of it for no reason or feeling disconnected if they cannot use it.

Co-author and psychologist Adrian Scott says there is a difference between people who use their phone and then get on with life, and people who constantly think about where their phone is or feel nervous if they do not have it.

A real eye opener is, according to a previous survey cited in the article, 63 per cent of entrepreneurs reported they would find it tougher to spend a day without their smart device than a week without their significant other.

As I am guilty of regularly checking my phone and mindlessly surfing the internet as a way to relax, I'm beginning to think it might be a good idea to have a regular digital detox day during my week, to break the habit and spend more time enjoying life the old fashioned technology-free way. Or at least use technology in a more mindful way - MHF has some great tips on how to achieve this.

Pacific identities and wellbeing: Cross-cultural perspectives

Agee, M.N., McIntosh, T., and Culbertson, P. (2013) Otago University Press

Weaving together perspectives, knowledge

This book spreads a mat that weaves together a wide range of perspectives and multiple knowledge traditions, and invites further discussion and sharing.

It weaves stories, research and language from across the Pacific, connecting particularly with New Zealand and the experiences of Pacific people who were born here or migrated.

Referencing a range of research that shows how important cultural identity is in developing mental wellbeing, chapters explore how Pacific people develop and negotiate identities, and find acceptance, exclusion and belonging.

Pacific identity throughout life

The work shared through the book weaves across the lifespan. Two chapters look at the experiences of Pacific young people in New Zealand schools.

One explores the development of positive racial-ethnic identity and identifies how Samoan young people experience both racism and positive pride in difference.

While another chapter looks at initiatives schools have put in place to improve learning outcomes and wellbeing for Pasifika students.

At the other end of the age spectrum, a section of the book considers death and dying, from a Tongan perspective, and through sharing insights from the Tangi Research Programme at the University of Waikato.

Exploring wellbeing

In exploring wellbeing, the book weaves together perspectives along the mental health spectrum from flourishing, with a sense of positive identity and belonging, to distress and suicidal feelings.

One chapter shares a M?ori tool for understanding this continuum, which has been used as a self-assessment tool for people to name and work with their emotional state.

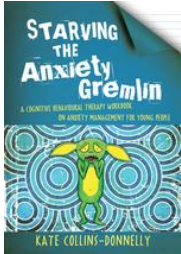
Tihei-wa Mauri Ora, a healing construct based on a M?ori creation story, invites people to consider where they sit on the continuum from darkness to light: Te Korekore (the realm of potential being) to Tihei-wa Mauri Ora (the living breath of life).

Unique support after suicide for New Zealand communities

Skylight is pleased to announce that their Waves programme, which supports those bereaved by suicide, is now going to be more widely available throughout New Zealand, thanks to new funding from the Ministry of Health.

On average, 10 people die by suicide every week in New Zealand. Research indicates that those bereaved by the suicide of a close friend or family member are at increased risk of developing complex grief reactions, including depression, Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD), and suicidality. 3. HPA (Health Promotion Agency)

Parental monitoring and substance use among Pacific youth 27 Aug 2014

Parents have a significant influence on the societal norms, values and behaviour learned by their children. Permissive parental rule setting and monitoring has been shown to relate to a greater likelihood of children engaging in health-compromising behaviours such as smoking tobacco and drinking alcohol. Tobacco smoking and alcohol consumption are of particular concern for Pacific youth - although smoking rates have been declining over time, they are still twice as likely to be regular smokers as their non-Pacific, non-Māori peers, and more likely to report drinking five or more alcoholic drinks in one session. To deter Pacific youth from taking up smoking or engaging in excessive alcohol consumption and, therefore, reduce health inequalities arising from such substance use, it is important to understand the relationships with protective factors such as parental monitoring.

HPA's Youth Insights Survey (YIS) is a key source of New Zealand data on adolescent substance use. The YIS monitors Year 10 students' behaviours, attitudes and knowledge on health-related topics, including tobacco smoking, alcohol consumption, and protective factors such as parental monitoring. 4. NZDF: New Zealand Drug Foundation

New website reaches New Zealand's hidden problem drinkers August 11, 2014

People struggling with their alcohol use now have a new online place where they can go to get help anonymously from others with similar experiences.

Living Sober (www.livingsober.org.nz) was launched today and is built for people wanting to examine their drinking habits by joining an online community of like-minded people.

The Living Sober online community is moderated by Lotta Dann, self-described former “boozy housewife” and author of the best-selling recovery memoir *Mrs D Is Going Without*. Lotta has been participating in online recovery since she gave up drinking nearly three years ago and knows how powerful the online community can be for people wanting to get sober.

“You have to do the work yourself, but you can’t do it alone”, she says “you need like-minded people to share with and be boosted along by. That’s why this site is so great. People know they’re all in there together talking to each other in kind, supportive and non-judgmental ways.”

The website is supported by the Health Promotion Agency, Matua Rai (Addiction Workforce Development) and the New Zealand Drug Foundation, who wanted to provide a new way to reach kiwis who suffer the ill-effects of alcohol but don’t present to traditional alcohol treatment services.

.The demand for this website is already breaking expectations, with over 400 members joining in the past 5 days. User feedback has been very positive:

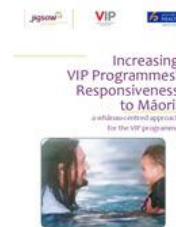

Media reporting of Robin Williams' death

The MHF is deeply saddened to hear of Robin Williams' tragic death. If you are affected by his death and need someone to talk to, please reach out for help. Keep an eye on your friends and family who may be vulnerable, and encourage them to seek help if they need it.

Many, many people care very deeply about the experiences of people who are in distress, and want to help. A good first port of call is your GP, or phone a helpline such as **Lifeline 0800 543 354 or the Suicide Prevention Helpline 0508 828 865.**

We are closely monitoring media reporting of Mr Williams' death. Research has demonstrated that there is a strong relationship between suicide reporting and a rise in suicidal thoughts and behaviours. The risk increases when someone identifies with a person whose suicide is reported and when stories are prominent or repetitive. Stories about suicide have the greatest impact on people who are already vulnerable, and this risk increases when the story is about a celebrity.

When a well-known person dies by suicide, and the media covers it prominently and repeatedly (as with Mr Williams' death), vulnerable people are put at risk, and we hope the media will work with us to remind those people that help is available, and where to get it.

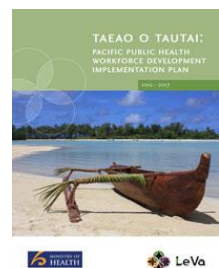
